5 CFR § 293.311 - Availability of information.

- § 293.311 Availability of information.
- (a) The following <u>information</u> from both the OPF and <u>employee performance</u> file system folders, their automated equivalent records, and from other <u>personnel record</u> files that constitute an <u>agency record</u> within the meaning of the FOIA and which are under the control of the <u>Office</u>, about most present and former Federal employees, is available to the public:
- (1) Name;
- (2) Present and past position titles and occupational series;
- (3) Present and past grades;
- (4) Present and past annual salary rates (including <u>performance</u> awards or bonuses, incentive awards, merit pay amount, Meritorious or Distinguished Executive Ranks, and allowances and differentials); (Emphasis added.)
- (5) Present and past duty stations (includes room numbers, shop designations, or other identifying <u>information</u> regarding buildings or places of employment); and
- (6) Position descriptions, identification of job elements, and those <u>performance standards</u> (but not actual <u>performance appraisals</u>) that the release of which would not interfere with law enforcement programs or severely inhibit <u>agency</u> effectiveness. <u>Performance</u> elements and standards (or work expectations) may be withheld when they are so interwined with <u>performance appraisals</u> that their disclosure would reveal an <u>individual</u>'s <u>performance appraisal</u>.
- (b) The <u>Office</u> or <u>agency</u> will generally not disclose <u>information</u> where the data sought is a list of names, present or past position titles, grades, salaries, <u>performance</u> standards, and/or duty stations of Federal <u>employees</u> which, as determined by the official responsible for custody of the information:
- (1) Is selected in such a way that would reveal more about the <u>employee</u> on whom <u>information</u> is sought than the six enumerated items, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy; or
- (2) Would otherwise be protected from mandatory disclosure under an exemption of the FOIA.
- (c) In addition to the <u>information</u> described in <u>paragraph (a)</u> of this section, a Government official may provide other <u>information</u> from these <u>records</u> (or automated equivalents) of an <u>employee</u>, to others outside of the <u>agency</u>, under a summons, warrant, subpoena, or other legal process; as provided by the <u>Privacy Act</u> (5 U.S.C. 552a(b)(4) through (b)(11)), under those <u>Privacy Act</u> routine uses promulgated by the <u>Office</u>, and as required by the FOIA.
